



Arnold Leon Long

January 29, 1946 - February 8, 2022

Arnold Leon Long, 76, of Mint Hill, died February 8, 2022, at Novant Medical Center in Mint Hill.

Arnold was born in Charlotte, NC, on January 29, 1946, the son of James Willard and Margie Rosich Long. His father owned and operated Long Texaco Service Station and Pool House at the corner of Margaret Wallace and Hwy 74. Arnold helped his father around the station. At the grand old age of 13, he met Ms. Geraldine Elaine Linker at the service station and they later married. When the United States drafted young men to serve in Vietnam, Arnold's number came up and he faithfully served in the US Army as part of the 561st Transport Company. Upon his faithful service and honorable discharge, he returned to his wife and daughter, who would not stop crying because she did not like her daddy in his green uniform. Arnold went on to further his education at UNC Charlotte, earning both an Associate of Arts and a Bachelor of Arts degree. He went to work for Phillip Morris, giving them 23 years and 9 months of faithful service as a machine operator before retirement. Arnold was not known for sitting still, however. He also had a side business in Concord with Jack Butler. His children remember weekends of helping their dad put cardboard inserts into boxes for the reward of ice cream from the Midland Ice Cream Shop. Arnold was not always about work, however, he loved spending time with family and friends. A long time coach for Mint Hill girl's softball, he was known as a terror for his hard driving practices and pushing his team to be their best. Contrary to his constant pushing of his softball team, however, many also knew Arnold loved turtles, including his pet turtle "Professor" and toy turtle, "Slow Down". Arnold was also a big fan of the Righteous Brothers, and the concerts turned into family outings. Up for a game of Poker? Arnold had you covered (along with many of his friends) and hosted many a poker game. He was also quite the tennis aficionado, playing on team for Phillip Morris during his time there and earning many trophies for his natural talents. One of his fondest hobbies, however, was Ford cars, especially his baby blue 1964 Ford Fairlane. Regardless of his life's loves and hobbies, however, what is uncontestable is that his greatest love in life was his family. The time he spent with them will be cherished forever and the unique spirit they knew as "The Blue Eyed Soul" will long be fondly remembered

and sadly missed.

Arnold is survived by his wife of 56 years (63 years if you count their courtship), Geraldine; his two daughters: Dee (husband Jim) Featherman and Lynn Long; two sisters: Judy Horne and Darlene Long; and grandchildren: Joseph Paul Long, Garrett Wayne Duncan, Leigha Lynn Sexton, Jamie Lee Duncan, Joshua Christopher Sexton, Dakota Grey Duncan and Logan Matthew Duncan. He is further survived by numerous other relatives, poker buddies and friends.

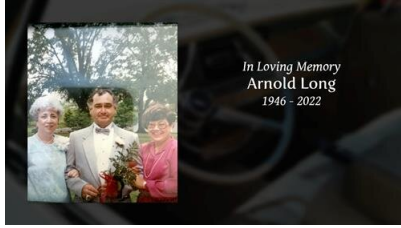

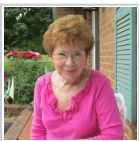
