“When I think about my sister, I have so many warm memories. She was obviously so very kind and merciful as a person. But it’s impossible to understand the depth of her kindness, gentle spirit and merciful nature apart from what originated that. From start to finish it was her faith that was the source of her powerful impact on the lives of those who knew her. But it wasn’t always that way. Beth was always a very sincere, sensitive person and never mean-spirited. But there was a time, back in her childhood, especially her early and middle teens, when she was a deeply troubled young woman. She went through very trying, even hellish experiences at that time, and in her desire to escape her pain, she began to engage in destructive and dangerous behaviors, running away, homeless, using drugs and worse. It’s amazing she survived this time. People who only met her after she surrendered her life to Christ, are totally shocked to hear of her background and lifestyle before coming to Christ.

Her breakthrough came when a new friend, a new Christian, invited her to a church meeting. There Beth was shocked to hear Jesus’ words in a song, that said “I am the resurrection and the life. And He who believes in me will live a new life.” She thought, “you mean I just have to believe.” She always thought she had to somehow pay for her misdeeds herself and didn’t ever see her life turning around. Aware of her desperate need, she humbled herself and believed in Jesus and experienced his love and forgiveness and mercy. And as Jesus said, from that moment on, he dramatically changed her on the inside and promptly began to give her a new life. As her life began to change dramatically from the inside out, everybody in our family noticed it! I remember, in shock, the first time hearing her talking to me about Jesus giving her a new life and personally experiencing his amazing love and acceptance of her, in spite of all the bad and crazy things she had done. I could hardly believe it was this same Beth saying these things about Jesus and his love and mercy to her. But she radiated a newfound joy, and depth of kindness and gentleness that was so profound, no one could ignore it and she said it was all because of the love Jesus had for her. Her

impact on our family was profound and lasting.

On a personal level, I remember at first, we all thought it must be just some kind of religious phase she was going through and something she'd outgrow. But as one year passed into the next, her steadfast faith in Jesus her love and kindness just persisted. It didn't fade, but grew brighter. Years later, in my middle teens, as I found myself an increasingly resentful, bitter and angry young man, I started considering that perhaps I needed Christ as well. I began to read the Bible and knew Jesus said, "Unless I was willing to give up everything I had, I couldn't be his disciple." I knew I hadn't done that, but it had to be all or nothing. At this time, Beth invited me to church, and as I stood in the back of a church in the midst of a worship service, I found myself toying with whether or not to give my whole life to Christ. The deciding factor as I considered this was the thought, "if God can do in my life, half of what he did in my sister Beth's life, he's got to be worth following all the way."

In that moment, not knowing how to tell Jesus I wanted to follow him, Beth's words suddenly came to me. I immediately remembered a bible verse Beth had told me, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." And so right then and there, in very large part due to the impact of her changed life, her love and prayers, and her sharing truth from scripture to me, I prayed those very words she had shared with me and gave my life to Christ. That was 46 years ago. And you know what, she was definitely on to something. It was the best thing I ever did.

I am sure I would never have given my life to Christ, if it wasn't for her. Jesus said, "He who is forgiven much loves much." And this is what marked Beth. She knew his great love, forgiveness and deep mercy. And this is precisely why Beth's life was so marked by deep love and deep mercy. It's why, she decided to set aside everything else and devote her life to showing great love and great mercy, not only being a great mother to her own three biological children, but also adopting one child after another, six altogether. Together with her three miscarriages, she devoted her life to mothering 12

children. Because she had received great mercy and great love, she lived a life showing and giving out great love and great mercy.

My last words to her were, "I love you and I'll see you later." She smiled and with a twinkle in her eye, as she reached out to hug me, she said, "Yes you will!" That's what she wanted for me and for everybody she knew. And I'm looking forward to it!
